The 137th International Medical Congress, the main academic event of the SLMA calendar, was held very successfully from 16th to 18th August 2024 at the Hotel Galadari, Colombo. The Congress Theme 'Ensuring Equity in Healthcare during Challenging Times' was selected at a time when it was evident that the Sri Lankan health sector was facing trying and challenging times. Therefore, it was imperative for us to focus on equity, despite the conundrums enforced on the system. Two distinguished past presidents of the SLMA, Professor Gita Fernando & Dr Suriyakanthie Amarasekera were awarded Honorary Life Memberships in recognition of the services rendered to their respective fields in medicine and to felicitate them for their immeasurable contributions towards the SLMA.

The much acclaimed SLMA Oration 2024 was delivered by Professor Athula Sumathipala, Emeritus Professor of Psychiatry, Keele University, UK as well as Emeritus Professor of Global Mental Health, Kings College, London, UK and Director of Institute for Research and Development in Health and Social Care, Colombo, Sri Lanka on "Global divide in health and research; ethical and governance challenges for low- and middle-income countries".

SLMA Main Congress

The 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) was held most successfully from 16th to 18th August 2024 at the Hotel Galadari, Colombo. The event attracted a large audience with numerous foreign and local resource persons participating both online and in person. This was one of the well-attended SLMA congresses in recent years, drawing close to 1500 in total (including the precongresses) from diverse specialties in medicine and allied health disciplines. This narrative is a bird's eye view of the academic proceedings during the congress but specific details of Pre-Congress Workshops, Orations, Abstracts and The Doctors' Concert have been left out as there are separate articles on those events.

Following the Inauguration Ceremony and the prestigious SLMA Oration in the morning of 16th August, the main congress commenced with an insightful Keynote Address by Professor Buddhi Marambe, Senior Professor attached to the Department of Crop Science, Faculty of Agriculture, University of Peradeniya on 'Food security challenges: Navigating through crises'. After the Keynote Address and the Professor NDW Lionel Memorial Oration, parallel sessions were conducted in Hall A and Hall B. Day 1 featured four plenary sessions and three symposia. The plenary sessions of Day 1 included 'The scope of laser treatment in keeping the glasses away' by Dr Charith Fonseka, 'Indiscriminate use of medicines' by Professor Chandanie Wanigatunga, 'The ageing brain: understanding and preventing cognitive decline' by Professor Varuni de Silva and 'Fast-tracking antimalarial drug discovery' by Professor Niroshini Nirmalan.

The three symposia of Day 1 were on 'Respiratory Medicine' by a panel of respiratory physicians, 'Mitigating the influence of Commercial Determinants of Health (CDoH)' organized by The World Health Organization (WHO) Country Office in Sri Lanka and 'Social protection for management of under nutrition' organized by The World Food Programme (WFP) Country Office in Sri Lanka.

The second day of the congress commenced with the Dr S Ramachandran Memorial Oration, followed by Plenary

Sessions on 'Coronary artery disease assessment' by Dr Wasantha Kapuwatta and 'Critical care: don't forget the patient' by Dr Dilshan Priyankara. The four symposia of the day covered, 'Cardiology - Case based discussions' by a panel of cardiologists, 'Intricacies of managing diabetes' by a panel of endocrinologists, 'Barriers to good hypertension control - beyond medication' by a panel of physicians and 'Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE): advocating and exploring strategies for influencing policy and creating public awareness' organized by The United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Country Office in Sri Lanka. The Panel Discussion of the SLMA Congress addressed the important topic 'The health impact by media advertising of cosmetics, nutritional supplements, and food targeting children', featuring experts from the medical and media fields. The highly anticipated SLMA lunchtime debate was on 'Modern medical innovations are primarily profit oriented'. The Guidance Clinic for overseas placements of doctors was held concurrently with the main congress on both Day 2 and Day 3, offering valuable insights from international consultants participating both online and in person. Day 2 concluded with a well-attended interactive case-based discussion titled 'From coma to storm - Mastering thyroid disorders'.

The final day of the congress began with the Dr SC Paul Memorial Oration which was then followed by two Plenary Sessions and five Symposia. The intriguing plenary sessions of Day 3 included 'Hippocrates' touch to algorithmic insight: AI for medical professionals' by Professor Pandula Siribaddana and 'Addressing the concerns of LGBTIQ+ persons and their families' by Dr Kapila Ranasinghe. The symposia of the final day covered 'Enabling a healthy food environment for school children and implementing food regulations' organized by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) Country Office in Sri Lanka, 'A fresh look at vaccines' organized by Vaccine and Infectious Diseases Forum of Sri Lanka (VIDFSL), 'Memento Mori: Death and dying in the modern world' by a panel of local and international experts in Medical Humanities, 'Technology enhanced medical education' organized by North Wales Medical School, Bangor University, UK and 'Infectious diseases: the new line of attack' by a panel of world-renowned researchers. The congress concluded with a highly attended workshop on 'Airway, ventilation and renal support for the critically ill patient'. Professor Hasini Banneheke, Vice President of SLMA and Chairperson of the Academic sessions organizing committee 2024,

delivered the closing remarks, marking a successful end to the 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the SLMA.

All in all, the scientific and scholastic fare served out during the academic deliberations over the three days of this conference were of the highest level. They incorporated state-of-the-art information on a multiplicity of disorders that affect humans and several other topics on allied subjects that would be of interest to a variegated medical audience. From the feedback that was received from the participants, it was evident that the efforts of the SLMA in furthering knowledge through such seminal Continuous Professional Development initiative were gratefully acknowledged by the participants.





















































































SLMA Orations

Dr Harini Fernando

Co-ordinator – Orations 2024 (Global Health & Humanitarian Medicine Content Developer - Médecins Sans Frontières, South Asia)

The Sri Lanka Medical Association Anniversary International Medical Congress traditionally holds four orations annually and for the 137th Congress in 2024 there was a neck-to-neck competition among 10 outstanding orations. The members of the orations committee appointed by the 2024 council independently reviewed the manuscripts of the orations and finalised the Orators unanimously.

Professor Athula Sumathipala delivered the **SLMA oration** which immediately followed the gracious inauguration of the 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress. The oration was themed 'Global divide in health and research; ethical and governance challenges for low and middle income countries' and highlighted the global disparities in research publications, highlighting the underrepresentation of LMICs in the research literature. Professor Sumathipala further emphasized the initiatives in building research ethics capacity, and discussed the broader impacts stemming from these efforts, which extend beyond mere publication outputs.

The **Professor NDW Lionel Memorial Oration** was delivered by Professor Priyadarshani Galappatthy and was titled 'Availability, affordability and indicators of medicines use in Sri Lanka: status prior to the crises and an analysis to address the challenges'. Professor Galappatthy drew attention to studies based on the pharmaceutical sector covering all 25 districts. Some of the data was presented for the first time and undoubtedly made advances to the knowledge on the pharmaceutical sector in Sri Lanka.

The **Dr S Ramachandran Memorial Oration** was delivered as the first session on the second day of the congress by Vidya Jyothi Professor Arjuna Priyadarsin De Silva. The oration was titled 'The FibroScan: the stethoscope of the hepatologist' and the audience gathered out numbered the hall capacity resulting in the most well-attended session of the 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress. Professor De Silva discussed how Fibroscans offer a less invasive and more precise approach to managing liver diseases, potentially revolutionizing hepatology practice, but reminded the need for further research to validate these findings and enhance patient care strategies.

The Dr SC Paul Memorial Oration was delivered by Professor Ishan De Zoysa and was based on 'Colorectal cancer: important aspects of aetiology, diagnosis, staging and prognosis'. Forming the inaugural session of the third and final day of the medical congress the Orator was escorted by the procession comprising the SLMA council members. After relating the many coincidental similarities and relationships between Dr S C Paul and himself, Professor De Zoysa kept the audience enthused by discussing how consumption of six or more cups of brown tea per day and beef consumption was found to be associated with Colorectal cancer and how autoantibody testing was useful in cancer diagnosis and how CT imaging alone could lead to over-staging of tumours. He addressed the significant association between the presence of the K- ras mutation in codon 12 and the occurrence of liver metastasis. Finally, he related the findings of how the circumferential resection margins and three-year survival was similar in those undergoing open surgery and laparoscopic surgery but that the latter had a significantly higher LN harvest.



















Research excellence spotlighted: Abstract highlights from SLMA Annual Congress

The 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the Sri Lanka Medical Association saw a strong response to its call for abstracts which started in March 2024 and closed at the end of April 2024. Over 200 abstracts were submitted, reflecting a wide array of innovative research from both national and international contributors.

Each submission was meticulously reviewed by an expert panel consisting of reviewers from the Ceylon Medical Journal, ensuring research of the highest quality was presented at the congress.

Of the submissions, 30 abstracts were selected for oral presentations, showcasing innovative research in a variety of medical fields. The 139 abstracts were selected to be presented as posters, allowing for broader participation and engagement during the congress.

The top abstracts were awarded prizes based on their scientific merit, originality and relevance to different areas of medicine. The following abstracts were recognized for the exceptional contributions:

At the first Council Meeting in January 2024, Vice President Professor Hasini Banneheke was appointed as the Academic Chair of the 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) 2024. She brought forward a new concept to organize Pre-Congress Workshops every month until the main congress in August. Among several objectives, the main aim was to address the needs of the membership, especially those who were serving in remote healthcare institutions with minimal facilities and supervision and others who wished to update their hands-on skills in the management of emergencies. Professor Banneheke invited Dr Pramitha Mahanama, one of the Council Members of the SLMA to become one of the Secretaries of the Congress and organize this series of such workshops, which he accomplished exceptionally well.

Organizing the first one was a challenge with difficulties in getting the best resource persons and the respective specialist colleges, and other stakeholders involved as there were many obstacles. A trauma surgeon from the USA (Dr Anushka Kotalawala Bagga, a friend of Professor Banneheke) who was visiting Sri Lanka devoted some time from her holiday to give the organizers the required boost. The initial workshops took many hours of free time from those who were involved in planning, organizing, and implementing.

With the continuous encouragement of the President of the SLMA, Dr Ananda Wijewickrama, the guidance and close supervision of Professor Banneheke, innovative ideas, skills in event planning, and the meticulous attention to detail by Dr Pramitha Mahanama, together with enormous support of many stakeholders and professional colleges, Council members of the SLMA, academic coordinator (Dr Anjana Jayakody), the office staff of the SLMA and sponsors, we were able to successfully conduct eight workshops from January to August with full-house participation of doctors representing various groups (from pre interns to consultants, Northern to

Southern areas of the country and medical doctors to allied healthcare staff and scientists). The topics for subsequent workshops were chosen based on the requests of participants obtained through the Pre-Congress Feedback Forms. Accepting the invitation made by Professor Banneheke and Dr Mahanama, Dr Rikaza Lantra (a non-council member, and event manager of the Congress) organized the last two workshops. Her immense commitment and dedication made those workshops to run flawlessly. The enthusiasm shown by participants was encouraging. There was a total of 991 participants for the workshops this year with some workshops restricting the registration to a maximum of 40 participants, as the objective was to provide hands-on practical skills).

The SLMA highly appreciates the immense contribution made by the Presidents and the workshop coordinator/ organizer of the respective colleges. The resource persons were very generous in sacrificing their time amidst their busiest schedules on a no-fee basis. The list of professional colleges and names of all resource persons of the workshops were published in the Congress Proceedings Book while that list is not reproduced here due to limited space.

- 7. Academic Publications and Manuscript Writing (organized by the Ceylon Medical Journal of the SLMA)



















A throwback after a successful ending... The 137th Anniversary International Medical Congress

The Inauguration ceremony held on the first day, prior to the commencement of the proper congress, followed the prestigious SLMA traditions and the SLMA oration. Dr Buddhi Marambe presented the Keynote Address. Three other orations were also delivered during the main congress and Dr Harini Fernando (Council Member) and Dr Lahiru Kodithuwakku (Secretary of the SLMA) took up

responsibilities for all aspects of orations, from calling for submissions, to the selection and then presenting on the day. Many United Nations organizations including the WHO joined hands with the SLMA to lighten up the event and Dr Lahiru Kodithuwakku (Secretary of the SLMA) coordinated all the activities pertaining to the UN organizations. All the eminent speakers who were resource persons of the Pre-Congress Workshops and the Main Congress deserve credit for much of the success we witnessed.

The lighter side of organizing the congress: The backdrop saga

When Congress Chair of SLMA 2024 who also holds the position of Vice President of the present council messaged me, 'Dear Madam, I'm planning to hand over to you a major portion of the SLMA congress. I have made you the chair of the subcommittee on branding/publicity/and visibility of the annual congress & hope you will accept my invitation on behalf of SLMA'. I perceived this as a cordial invitation, but I recognized this as an order in disguise. Two consequences were to happen if I said 'Yes', my long-awaited visit to see my relatives in Vancouver would be postponed to August. Theme of the year 'Ensuring Equity in Healthcare during Challenging Times' would apply to me as 'Balancing Mental Health During Challenging Times' as chair of visibility committee in itself was a challenge.

This turned out to be worse in some aspects. Congress scheduled for July was to actually happen in August. September is not the best of months to visit Canada. As a person generally considered as a 'cool head' balancing mental health never became an issue.

In my new job of developing material to make congress more visible, I was to get support for IT from Parenthrive a company who offered to help SLMA.

All of us as medical professionals have attended numerous events of inaugurations, inductions, scientific meetings both locally & internationally but I have barely paid attention to designs of flyers, backdrops or other material other than at College of Paediatricians. As Paediatricians we always decorate our material with happy cartoon figures. I always considered the people who were responsible for these as tech wizards. Now I'm on my way to find one or maybe become one.

I generally look at myself as one with levity: gravity - 50:50. The responsibility bestowed on me changed this balance. As my first step I became very serious about depicting the theme in our material but requests for ideas didn't receive any response.

Weather became nasty during this time of the year & being interested in nature & photography I thought why not use an image of a sturdy tree swaying in a storm to depict challenging times or turmoil in lives of young, old, male, female, different skin colour, various professionals, healthy normal or with special needs.

From the beginning I was warned by congress chair that Secretary, SLMA is very keen to avoid red colour in the material as red is not easy on the eye. Congress chair promoted the idea of selecting colours from peacock feathers. With few inputs from me & other members of the team Vindula from Parentthrive developed few flyers. There was a tree swaying in the storm shown as branches bent to a side, but the tree didn't look like a tree caught in a storm. There was a glum looking male doctor with a Steth around his neck, prim looking nurse in uniform, a girl with hair cascading down who later became pregnant, ambulance 1990 in the background, a plane taking off depicting citizens leaving the country, pregnancy was terminated & she became a young girl again, a man was in a wheelchair & few cartoon kids' faces appeared & erased from time to time. Vindula kept on changing without any protest & we also commented & changed as we wished.

At one point there was a strong query whether we should depict the theme on the flyers & why not nature, scenes from countryside, Colombo landscape or skyscape. I kept my sanity looking at the changes. At one point there were figures from Aragalaya in the background, herd of Elephants in the centre panel, airplane taking off with doctors migrating to foreign lands, more female figures as present day medical profession is dominated by females & correct gender balance became a political statement.

Before I lost my sanity, we moved on to preparing flyers calling for abstracts. Anjana our tech savvy pre intern produced very attractive & unique flyers using facade of the Wijerama House / SLMA building.

Again we were back to flyers & backdrops using colours from peacock feathers, the hues changed from sea green to turquoise to blue which rapidly turned to purple & magenta. A peacock looking at the screen would not have been able to identify that colours originally came from its feathers. I was in a sweat thinking of the day this came as a backdrop at the inauguration.

World Patient Safety Day is an opportunity to raise public awareness and foster collaboration between patients, health workers, policymakers and healthcare leaders to improve patient safety. It is celebrated globally every year on the 17th of September. This year the theme is "Improving diagnosis for patient safety" with the slogan "Get it right, make it safe!", highlighting the critical importance of correct and timely diagnosis in ensuring patient safety and improving health outcomes.

Resolution WHA72.6 and the Global Patient Safety Action Plan 2021–2030 highlight the need for ensuring the safety of diagnostic processes. The global action plan encourages countries to adopt strategies that reduce diagnostic errors, which often arise from a combination of cognitive and system factors that impact the recognition of patients' key signs and symptoms, and the interpretation and communication of their test results. The magnitude of diagnostic errors is profound, accounting for nearly 16% of preventable harm across health systems. With most adults likely to face at least one diagnostic error in their lifetime, substantial work needs to be done to improve the safety of diagnostic processes.

 Give prominence to diagnostic safety in patient safety policy and clinical practice at all levels of health care, aligned with the Global Patient Safety Action Plan 2021–2030.

- 3. Foster collaboration among policy-makers, health care leaders, health workers, patient organizations, and other stakeholders in advancing correct, timely and safe diagnosis.
- 4. Empower patients and families to actively engage with health workers and healthcare leaders to improve diagnostic processes.

World Patient Safety Day 2024 proposes a wide range of activities, such as national campaigns, social media activities, advocacy and technical events, to be organized on and around 17 September. In this regard, the Directorate of Healthcare Quality and Safety, of the Ministry of Health held an island-wide competition on best practices among healthcare institutions. The received best practices were short-listed and judged by an expert panel to select three best practices each from the Line and Provincial ministry categories. The winners were awarded at the World Patient Safety Day National Event, which was held on the 7th of September 2024, at Marino Beach Hotel Colombo with the patronage of the Secretary of Health, and the participation of Ministry of Health officials, representatives from islandwide hospitals, regional and provincial directors of health services and patient groups.

Further, a signature mark of the global campaign is lighting up iconic monuments in the colour orange. This year the Ministry of Health will illuminate the iconic Colombo Municipal Council Building on the 17th of September as a symbol of our dedication to improving diagnosis for patient safety in Sri Lanka.

Objectives of World Patient Safety Day 2024

 Raise global awareness of errors in diagnosis contributing to patient harm and emphasize the pivotal role of correct, timely and safe diagnosis in improving patient safety.
